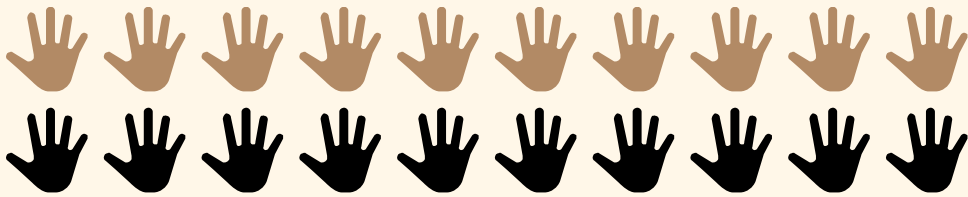

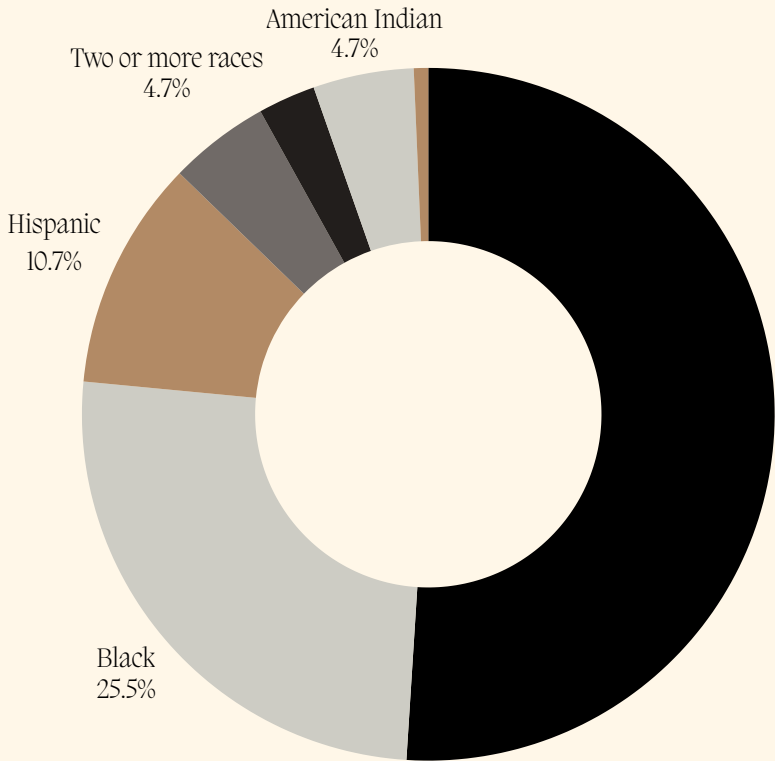

55 Youth Attended

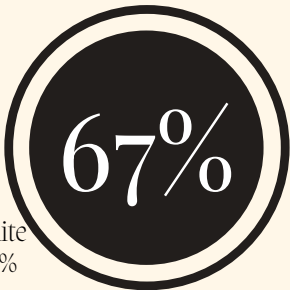

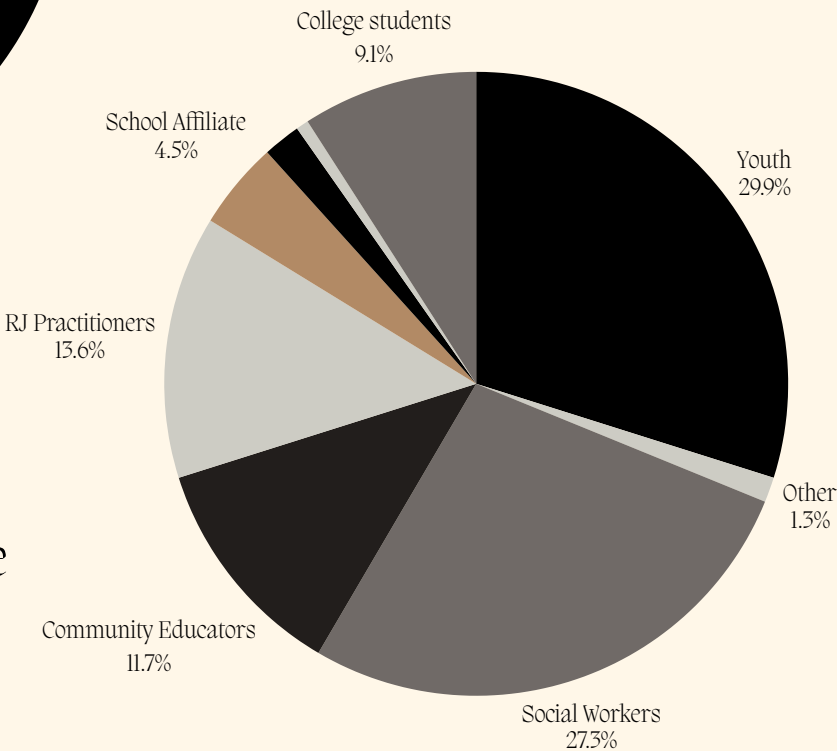
56 participants completed the post-event evaluation. This represents a response rate of 57%.

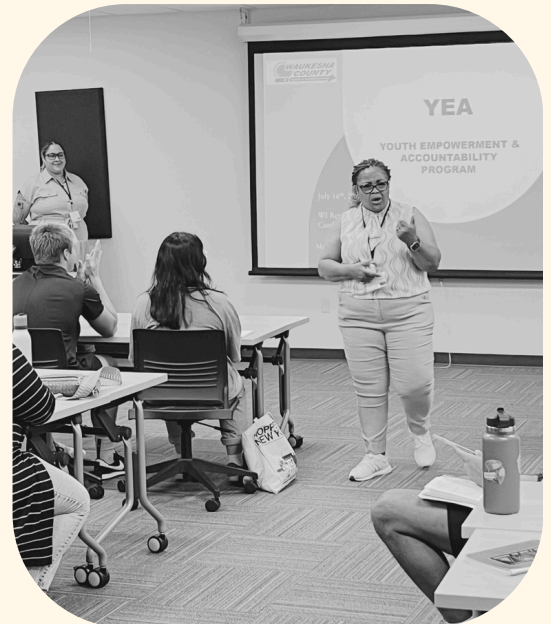

“Community plays a great role in restorative practices and making sure everyone is included in the rehabilitation and recovery of people.”

“I will work to build relationships and be an advocate for other young people.”

“Be more vocal with adults so they understand they need to appear to us not the other way around.”

What Participants Will Do Differently After The Summit

“Embrace our youth’s thoughts more often.”

“I will consider everybody's stories and upbringings.”

“Use more restorative practices in the classroom.”

“Value youth voice.”

“Make sure to bring youth back when they straggle afar.”

“Leverage partnerships and advocate for spaces centering student voice in my school.”

“Try to use repair and restorative practices every time.”

“I will become more involved in my community.”
